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Blood scandal victims died before getting promised compensation

FIGHT ON

THE son of a woman who died before getting her infected blood scandal compensation joined campaigners delivering a letter to 10 Downing Street warning of the “physical and emotional burden” of the “continual fight for fair compensation”.

Town, saw his mother die aged 64 earlier this year months before she was due to receive around £500,000 in a long-awaited payout.

In a letter delivered to Sir Keir Starmer at 10 Downing Street, campaigners hit out at political delays that

have seen dozens of people die before getting their payments.
